



## **Genealogy and Local History**



The arch at First Avenue and Third Street welcomed soldiers when they returned home from World War One. After numerous accidents and near accidents, the city council was informed that the arch obstructed the view of drivers and pedestrians and the city could be held liable if the arch wasn't torn down. The arch was torn down after a vote of the City Council in July 1921. In the above photo, the building to the right of the arch is the Lawrence Building. There is a lot of talk in Sterling right now about the new apartments being built in the upper floors of the Lawrence Building. That building holds lots of local history. The first floor at the present time is occupied by a branch of the Whiteside County court system. At one time there was a Woolworth store located there and the radio station WSDR was located in the basement.

#### **Director's Corner**



#### Ramp Closure

Great News! In January, the Director received word from the Illinois State Library that the library was awarded a Library Service and Technology Grant (LSTA) in the amount of \$48,000 to offset the cost to replace the landing, stairs and ramp to the main entrance of the library. The total cost to replace the ramp is \$96,000+. The ramp was installed with the first addition to the library back in 1986. Over the years, weather and settling issues have forced the Library Board to address the ramp for safety issues. The Library Board has accepted bids and will award the contract to begin the work soon. The goal is to start the project Monday, September 11th with completion by the end of October. What does this mean to our library patrons? The main entrance and ramp will be closed and unavailable. We encourage our patrons to use the Children's entrance located on the North side of the building. The elevator will be available to the main floor. We understand that not all of our patrons are able to use stairs or are willing to use the elevator. Don't worry the staff is willing to bring materials down to the juvenile desk for checkout.

#### Patron Feedback

Patrons occasionally make comments about the library. The following are some of those comments.

- "The new additions made to the library really maintained the integrity of the Carnegie building. (These additions were added in 1985 and 1995)
